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#### **INTRODUCTION**

#### I. About the Centre:

The National Centre for Good Governance been established (NCGG) has bv Government of India under the aegis of the Department of Administrative Reforms and Public Grievances, Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievance and Pensions, New Delhi. Prior to this the Centre was under the aegis of Department of Personnel and Training, New Delhi. The Centre was created by upgrading the erstwhile National Institution of Administrative Research (NIAR), Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration (LBSNAA), Mussoorie, with an expanded mandate. NCGG is an autonomous institution registered as a Society under the Societies Registration Act 1860, with its Head Office at New Delhi and Registered Office at Mussoorie.

#### **II.** Mandate of NCGG:

The National Centre for Good Governance is envisaged to be the apex think- tank of the country that would guide Government and help in implementing good Governance reforms. It seeks to be a high-level institute for research and training to deal with the entire gamut of governance issues from the National to State to the local level and in sectors across the Government. It aims to be a national level

multi-disciplinary institute devoted to actionresearch and analytical studies for supporting good governance strategy, action plan and their implementation with its jurisdiction all over India.

The outcome of the Centre's work is in the form of research papers, studies on best practices on Governance reforms and policy analysis. Its goal is to provide the necessary direction, guidance and capacity-building inputs on Governance and management issues to the Central and State Government organizations, Central Training Institutes and State Administrative Training Institutes.

#### III. Objectives:

The objectives and functions of NCGG are:

- i. To be the apex think tank of the country in guiding and implementing Citizen Centric good Governance reforms administrative, social, financial and political.
- ii. To function as a national repository on information on best practices, initiatives and methodologies that promote good Governance, e-Governance initiatives, change management and capacity building within the Government.

- iii. To work towards resolution of key issues in governance, analysis of policy and programme implementation, develop action plans, support governance reforms and provide help in developing synergy across various sectors and Ministries/Departments of GoI, and State Governments.
- iv. To initiate research into various aspects of regulatory and developmental administration, urban and regional planning, sustainable development, social sector programmes and public management/ public policy with special reference to agrarian issues.
- To coordinate and organize training v. programmes sponsored by various government, non-government and foreign agencies. NCGG would provide direction, guidance and capacity building inputs on governance and management issues to the Central /State Government organizations and Central Training Institutes and State ATIs in the form of research papers, best practices on governance reforms, policy analysis and options.
- vi. To hold National Consultations on topical issues, involving all the concerned stakeholders, with a view to evolve consensus with regard to the adoption and execution of policies in the public interest. To interact with other national and international organisations, in and outside government, engaged in research and training in subject areas of mutual interest.

#### **IV.** Governing Body:

NCGG is governed by a Governing Body, under the Chairmanship of the Cabinet Secretary. The affairs of the Society are being managed under the overall superintendence, direction and control of the Governing Body. The other members include secretaries of various departments of government of India, eminent academicians and members of Civil Society with expertise and interest in governance reforms. The composition of the members of the Governing Body is listed in Annexure I.

#### V. Management Committee:

NCGG has a Management Committee with Secretary, Department of Personnel & Training (DoPT) as the Chairperson. The other members are heads of reputed training institutes, research organizations and eminent administrators and academicians. The composition of the members of the Management Committee is listed in Annexure II.

## ACTIVITIES OF NCGG DURING THE YEAR 2017-18

#### I. Governance

Technical Workshop on 'Citizen Centric Governance' Simplification of Forms:

National Centre for Good Governance (NCGG) has been facilitating and providing a platform to implement good governance reforms in the country. Keeping in view, its vision and also the mandate of the Hon'ble Prime Minister, NCGG, in collaboration with



various Ministries and Departments of Government of India, has taken series of initiatives for Simplification of forms and procedures.

#### The objectives of the workshop are:

- 1. To engage stakeholders in review of the forms from the user perspective.
- 2. To deliberate upon the changes required in the forms to facilitate easy flow of information and fastening of procedure.
- 3. To understand the change required in the form and recommending the suggestions for change to respective authorities.
- 4. To do away the obsolete forms.

#### **Methodology**

The methodology adopted so far involves four steps: forming a core group consisting of departmental employees; working intensively with the core group over a week or so; organizing one or more technical workshops involving stakeholders as well as concerned departmental officials for discussion on suggested changes and adoption of proposed changes by the department.

After the final workshop, NCGG and concerned departmental officials work on suggested simplified forms. The department does the process to get approval from the competent authority to implement simplified forms.

#### II. National Rural Drinking Water Program and Swachh Bharat Mission (Gramin)

## National Key Resource Centre for Water and Swachh Bharat Mission (Gramin):

The Government of India, Ministry of Drinking Water and Sanitation has empanelled the National Centre for Good Governance, Mussoorie as one of the National Key Resource Centres on Water and SBM (G). The National Key Resource Centre (NKRC) at senior NCGG aims at apprising the management personnel and key policy makers working in this sector with the latest developments in the field and to equip them with knowledge that would help them in developing a comprehensive understanding of the sector and enable them to make more effective interventions.

## Capacity Building Training Programmes on Water and Swachh Bharat Mission (G):

The National Centre for Good Governance (NCGG) has been organizing a series of Capacity Building Training Programmes which have been entrusted by the Ministry of Drinking Water and Sanitation (MoDWS), Government of India in both Water and SBM (Gramin) sector separately. Initially, the

programmes were jointly conducted for both Water & Sanitation sector. However, from 2012 onwards the trainings are being conducted separately for Water and Sanitation (now Swachh Bharat Mission-Gramin). The target groups for these training interventions were the Administrators of development agencies, Engineers from PHEDs, Elected Representatives from PRIs and various voluntary organizations.

## **State Specific Capacity Building Training Programmes under Water sector:**

NCGG has successfully organized four Training cum Exposure visit on water issues for Public Health Engineering Department for the state of Rajasthan. A total of 98 Engineers In addition, NCGG has were trained. organized one training programme for the Engineers of Water Resource Department for Rajasthan State in which 22 Engineers were trained. The CBTP aimed to address the emerging issues related to water sector with a view to get an insight into the status of water related issues in the state and also exposure to show the best practices of community managed water supply scheme, communitydemand driven and participatory approach with community mobilization and involvement. The programmes organized during 2017-18 are listed in Annexure IV.



## Swachh Bharat Mission (Gramin) and its Objectives:

To accelerate the effort to achieve Universal Sanitation Coverage and to pur focus on sanitation, the Prime Minister of India, Shri Narendra Modi, launched the Swachh Bharat Mission on 2<sup>nd</sup> October, 2014. It aims to achieve Swachh Bharat by 2019 as a tribute to Mahatma Gandhi on his 150th Birth Anniversary. The Mission's target is to improve the cleanliness levels in rural India through appropriate Solid and Liquid Waste Management (SLWM) activities by making the Gram Panchayats Open Defecation Free (ODF) clean and sanitized.

The main objectives of the Swachh Bharat Mission (Gramin) are:

- (i) to bring an improvement in the general quality of life in the rural areas;
- (ii) to accelerate sanitation coverage in rural areas to ensure all Gram Panchayats attain Nirmal status up to 2019;
- (iii) to motivate the Panchayati Raj Institutions and communities promoting sustainable sanitation facilities through awareness creation

- and health education;
- (iv) to encourage adoption of ecologically and economically effective technologies for sustainable sanitation; and
- (v) to develop community managed environmental sanitation systems focusing on overall cleanliness in the rural areas.

## Capacity Building Training Programmes for DMs/DCs/CEOs/ZP Presidents on Swachh Bharat Mission (Gramin):

The Ministry of Drinking Water Sanitation (MoDWS), Government of India has assigned the National Centre for Good Governance to organize Training-cum-Orientation Workshops on Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM-G) for District Magistrates/ District Collectors/Chief Executive Officers Presidents and Zilla Panchayat (DCs/DMs/CEOs/ZP Presidents). objective of the programme is to create awareness, gain knowledge and learn best practices and to ensure the better implementation and sustenance of National Mission across the country. In this context, a series of Orientation Training Programme on Swachh Bharat Mission (G) were organized for DCs/DMs/CEOs/ZP Presidents/ BDOs by



NCGG in the first phase during 2015-16. Further NCGG has organized Capacity Building Training Programmes for Zilla Swachh Bharat Preraks (ZSBP) during 2017-18 where a total of 180 ZSBP have been trained on SBM (G). The programmes are listed in Annexure V.

# State Specific Capacity Building Training Programmes under Swachh Bharat Mission (Gramin):

In addition above, KRC, NCGG has organized state specific Capacity Building Training Programmes for ZP members/twenty-points programme members, PRIs for the district of Bokaro, Hazaribagh and Khunti of Jharkhand State. A total of 5 training programmes were conducted, in which three programmes were conducted for District Bokaro; programmes were conducted for District Hazaribagh for Jharkhand State during 2017-18. A total of 182 participants were trained. The key objective of these programmes is to sensitize the participants to achieve the ODF objective demand driven and community managed campaign which is essential to motivate masses at GP level so that they can initiate the advocacy process at the village level in their respective district to create an enabling environment for ironing out the barrier in implementation of SBM (G). Details are given in Annexure VI.

# Trainings on Public Policy, Governance and Advanced Leadership Development Programmes:

The National Centre for Good Governance (NCGG). Department of Administrative Reforms & Public Grievances, Govt. of India has organized Training Programmes for State Administrative Services (SAS) at Indira Bhawan Campus, LBSNAA, Mussoorie on "Public **Policy** & Governance" and "Advanced Leadership Development **Programme**" for various States of the country. The key objectives of the training programmes are as follows:

- To provide an over-arching view of various perspectives of Public Policy & Governance;
- To equip officers with techniques for improving delivery of public service;
- To share the best practice on governance and public policy, so as to enable contextualized adoption and scaling up at national, state and local government levels;
- To discuss on global best practices on good governance and public policy and



their relevance in Indian context;

- To create awareness among the state officials about the changing scenario of public policies with increasing influence to national and international drivers;
- To enhance the capacity of state officials to minimize the personal risk, participatory governance, respect to administrative ethics and values, and concern of legal and constitutional base of a public policy;
- To strengthen the state authorities in making balance with modern obligations and traditional governance, in order to efficient public service delivery; and
- To strengthen the state authorities to formulate contemporary policies, their implementation governance, and monitoring and evaluation of public service delivery process in order to ensure Good Governance

In continuation of this series of training programmes, NCGG has conducted 6 training programmes (August, 2017 to February, 2018) on Public Policy & Governance and Advanced Leadership Development Programmes for the various States wherein a total of 149 officers were participated. The training programmes are being supported by the General Administrative Department (GAD) of the concerned State. The details are listed in Annexure VII.

## Training Programme for Judges of Uttarakhand:

The Uttarakhand Judicial & Legal Academy (UJALA) has also entrusted to National Centre for Good Governance on Special Training Programme for Civil Judges (Jr. Division-2014 for State of Uttarakhand. These training programmes for Judges is the first step towards realizing the vision of the Hon'ble High Court of Uttarakhand for improving the judicial system of the State. The details are given in Annexure VIII.





#### III. Trainings 2017-2018

Mid-Career Training Programme in Field Administration for Civil Servants of Bangladesh:

The National Centre for Good Governance has been engaged to conduct Mid-Career Training Programme in Field Administration for Civil Servants of Bangladesh at NCGG, Mussoorie since April, 2013. NCGG was given the mandate to train 1500 civil servants of Bangladesh by the Ministry of External Affairs.

The importance of MCTP programmes has been highlighted during the Joint Declaration dated June 7, 2015 between Bangladesh and India during the visit of Prime Minister of India to Bangladesh and subsequent commitment of India to training capacity building of Bangladesh and officials. During the visit of Bangladesh Prime Minister to India in April 8, 2017, the Prime Minister of Bangladesh expressed



satisfaction on the Mid Career Training Programmes.

NCGG has successfully organized 8 programmes from April, 2017 to March 2018 and trained 272 Civil Servants of Bangladesh during the period. Thus a total of 1407 participants have been trained till March, 2018 by the Centre.

The objectives of the Training Programme are:

- To have an understanding of Indian Administrative and Governance Approaches.
- To gain an insight into the Indian Rural Development Approaches and Best Practices.
- To gain an insight into the Urban Development Plan and learn from the best practices adopted.
- To have an understanding of various good e-governance experiences on India in various sectors.
- To learn from the Disaster Management Techniques and approaches through Case Studies.
- To have an exposure to Good Projects.

The programmes organized during 2017-18 are listed in Annexure IX.

## **Special Training Programme for Deputy Commissioners of Bangladesh:**



In addition to the Mid Career Training Programme in Field Administration for Bangladesh's Civil Servants, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), Govt. of India, New Delhi assigned NCGG with the task of organizing three Special Training Programmes Deputy Commissioners for (DCs) Bangladesh during 2017-18. NCGG has successfully conducted the programmes and trained almost all the DCs of all 64 districts of A total of 124 Deputy Bangladesh. Commissioners have been trained till date by special training In the three programmes conducted this year a total of 48 participants have been trained. The programmes were very well received by the

participants. The programmes organized during 2017-18 are listed in Annexure X.

#### **Management Development Programmes:**

NCGG has successfully conducted 4 Five-Days Management Development Programmes for Senior Executive of Coal India Ltd. and Senior Officers of Lok Sabha Secretariat during the year at Mussoorie. A total of 78 participants have been trained in the above programmes. The programmes were very well received by the participants both for content and delivery.

## Training Programme for State Civil Servants:

In addition, the NCGG has also organized a Five-Day Training Programme on Public Policy and Governance for the Officers of Odisha Administrative Service and two weeks Training Programmes on Public Policy and Governance for the officers of Mizoram Civil Service and Manipur Civil Service. The programmes were very well received by the participants. The details of the programmes are listed in Annexure XI. A total of 58 participants have been trained in the above programmes. The programmes were very well received by the participants both for content and delivery.



## IV. Centre for Climate Change & Environment (CCC&E):

The Centre for Climate Change & Environment (CCC&E) was established in the Centre for Good Governance National (erstwhile National Institute of Administrative Research) in collaboration with the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) in Over the tenure of four years, the 2011. Centre has worked with LBSNAA and the State Administrative Training Institutes (ATIs) to develop Climate Change Training Modules for use as reference material for Civil Service Officers under-training at these institutes. The Centre is committed to build capacities of Civil Service Officers on climate change issues by enhancing their knowledgebase and skill-set for effectively addressing the challenges posed by climate change in their sectoral domains. The Centre, in its capacity as a knowledge institution, has also developed knowledge products on climate change.

Training material used by LBSNAA was reviewed and revised through engagement of KPMG India. Modules have been developed

for Foundation Course, Inducting Training Programme, IAS Professional Phase I – Phase V courses. Accordingly, climate change courses were incorporated in the training programmes (Foundation Course, Phase I, Phase IV and Phase V) as per revised framework. During the year continuous follow up has been done with LBSNAA faculty and State ATIs for incorporating the modules in their training framework. Further, training material were developed for State ATIs after a Training Need Assessment exercise. KPMG India was engaged by UNDP, India to develop these modules which include common as well as region specific training modules on Climate Change for various geo-climatic zones of India i.e. Arid Zone, Central Zone, Coastal Zone, Himalayan Region, Indo-Gangetic Zone and North East Zone.

CCC&E has submitted a proposal to the Ministry of Environment Forests and Climate Change, Government of India to support its activities in order to continue contributing to the international and national commitments of India related to climate change.



## FACILITIES AVAILABLE AT NCGG, MUSSOORIE


The Building Complex includes Faculty rooms, office space for staff, library, computer laboratory, conference hall, guest rooms, dining hall, kitchen, and lounge.
